O God, father of life, we come to you with praises on our lips, and thanks in our hearts. You are the great provider, and know what is on our hearts. (May we each take a few moments to hold up those we know and love who are in need of comfort and healing..................................) It seems our world is pressing in on us and our lives at times, seem out of our control. But you are there, watching, guiding, and lovingly showing to us a more perfect way. We are grateful for your gift of salvation, bought through the sacrifice of Jesus, in whose perfect name we pray, Amen

There are lots of events in our lives that cause us to celebrate; weddings, the birth of a child, a new job or promotion. Even sporting events can cause us to cheer and even at times shed tears of joy. (Not often enough for teams from Cleveland.) How about worship? How should we act during a Sunday service?

There is a moment in the book of Nehemiah that can be instructive. The walls and gates of Jerusalem have been rebuilt and the people who

have been in exile have returned. The people call for Ezra the Priest to read from The Book of the Law of Moses. They stood, bowed their heads, and when they heard the word of God they wept. (Nehemiah 8: 1-9)

Why did they weep? They were reminded of the grace of God; blessings for their obedience, captivity if they disobeyed, and forgiveness if they repented and returned to God. During their lives they had seen and lived through it all, and now have found themselves back home and forgiven, just as God had promised. Their tears of sorrow were turned to tears of joy and outward celebration when they realized they were receiving God's grace and His precious promise!

Every Sunday we also get to hear God's promises read to us. And every Sunday we have a chance to better understand His grace, hope, and peace. As Nehemiah told the gathering, "This day is sacred to our Lord. Do not grieve, for the joy of the Lord is your strength." (verse 10) I like that. The joy of the Lord is *our* strength! In other words, it is perfectly fine to express your joy and release during worship, especially when emotions fill your heart. I can't tell you how many times I have teared up and am unable to speak when my heart has been touched. In fact, I've seen more than a few of you wipe away a tear or want to raise a hand in praise or shout out alleluia or amen! Trust me, God wants you to know that it's ok.

Whether applauding a beautiful song, having a prayer convict your heart, or God's word touch your soul, don't ever be afraid to outwardly express your heartfelt emotions, love, and praises to God.
