Competition!

As a sales rep, one of my standing rules was that I would only set up customers based on the number of people who lived in any particular town. Competition is good, but I didn't want to create hostile rivalries.

I also promoted the idea that each of my customers should know about and respect the other. Why? Simple. What if you had a large job to install but discovered that a two-dollar part was missing? Everything would be put on hold and your client would be disappointed. Maybe the store across town has the part you need and could help you out. But only if you were on speaking terms with them. And then, would you be willing to help them out if they needed something you may have? Good clean competition is one thing, helping someone in need is even better.

I can hear a few of you saying, "Ok Rich, thanks for the lesson in running an honorable business! Now what?"

There is a brief story in the book of Luke that speaks of good vs. bad competition. John and the other disciples were walking down the road and saw a man driving out demons in the name of Jesus. So, they tried to stop him. In fact, in John's words he says, "...we tried to stop him

because he is not one of us." Jesus responds by saying, "Do not stop him, for whoever is not against you is for you." (Luke 9:49-50.)

Note the words, "...he is not one of us." Sounds like they are really full of themselves. What they were ultimately saying was, "We have exclusive rights on saving others." In other words, they didn't want any competition. Jesus sets them straight by telling them that anyone working for the good of others is on our side, and we should not hinder them but to help and support them whenever it's needed.

We should never let competition and possibly even jealousy to ever get in the way of helping others and doing good in the world. In fact, I hope as my little story above illustrates, we need to get to know and then understand those around us, so we can team up and work together for the Glory of God.
