I read a story the other day about a pastor who was shepherding a small church of around 150 people in China, in the early 1950's. One day as the service was being conducted, soldiers entered, arrested the pastor, beat the people of the congregation and closed down the building. As punishment for leading a church, the pastor was made to deliver sacks of coal by hand to the entire village. It was degrading to his character, and punishing to his body. However, after a time, he began to think, "What would Jesus do? How would He act and respond?"

He concluded that Jesus would use His time and His interacting with the people of the village to show love and peace, regardless of the outcome. So, he began to smile, to speak to everyone he delivered coal to, and even helped them with day to day chores.

Years later, the restrictions against Christianity were lifted and he was once again allowed to start a church. The first few Sundays were rather lean with only a handful of people showing up. But, word began to spread that the pastor of the church that just opened was the man who delivered the coal; the very man who always had a smile or a kind word for everyone he met. Within a month, he was blessed by God with a new and eager congregation of over 900 people.

What comes to mind is the scripture found in 1 Peter, chapter 2, verse 21. Peter writes, "To this you were called, because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example that you should follow in His steps." Peter writes these words for some slaves who were owned by evil masters. What he was saying in essence was, "Do what Jesus would do. Copy Him." Show kindness even in the face of adversity. Sounds exactly the same as what the pastor in China did. And because he followed Jesus' example, not only was he blessed, but the whole community was transformed.

We may not be facing as daunting of challenges as our pastor friend faced, but we all face choices, decisions, situations that need to be seen clearly before acted upon. We need to ask more than, "What should I do?" To get the best answer we must first ask the question, "What would Jesus do?" If you start there, pray for guidance, and follow His example, I think you will find that the answer or solution you need will be shown to you.

Following in the steps of Jesus will never lead you wrong. You just need the courage to do what Jesus would do.
