During my time at college, I also worked at Ashland Florist. It was quite a learning experience. In fact, I think I learned more practical life lessons there than all my time spent studying.

My duties ranged from floral deliveries to floral arrangements. From decorating homes and businesses during holidays to the repair and maintenance of the boiler system. It was quite a broad education.

But one of the best duties was working in the 4 greenhouses we had. It was almost a non-stop job of preparing the benches, sterilizing the soil, and planting all types of flowers and plants. In fact, almost all the flowers that were sold were grown in-house.

I still remember the very first time I helped in the greenhouse. On a special bench with specially prepared soil, we planted the seeds; not too deep or too shallow. Once planted, all that was needed was regular watering, plenty of sun, and lots of time to allow them to germinate. Time was the hardest. Every day I would check to see if there was any growth. The wait seemed endless.

But then, small bits of yellow and green began to appear. I wanted to push some of the soil away to make it easier for the sprouts to come up, but I was told, the harder the effort, the heartier the plant would be. I found out that the most important stage of growth is during the time when these small sprouts are fighting their way through the soil toward the light of the sun. Sounds like there is a lesson here!

It's so easy to talk about all the accomplishments in our lives. All the good things we have attained. All the things that we consider triumphs and goals. However, if we are honest with ourselves, the true growth in our character that makes us stronger, is actually the result that comes from our times of pain and struggle.

James tells us to, "consider it pure joy" when we "face trials of many kinds." (James 1: 2) Full of joy as we face hardship and trials?!

God often allows us to go through hardships and challenges that will mold us into the person He wants us to be. Like the seedlings, He waits for us to come up, out of the struggles of life to become, as James writes, "mature and complete, not lacking anything." (vrs.4)

So, when life presses in around you, just remember, you are still growing, pushing up through the soil, ready to bloom into the beautiful flower you were meant to be.
