Our annual church congregational meeting will be Sunday, December 5th, immediately after our service. We will be voting on our 2022 budget and slate of officers. For our Advent offering this year, we will be collecting snacks and one cup meals for "The Lord's Pantry" in West Salem. Because of their current need, we have started collecting now through the end of December. Pastor Mike and his team are helping 300 children in the area by supplying backpacks, one cup meals, single serving boxes or packs of cereal, and individual snack packs of cookies and crackers. There is a selection of items on a table in the gathering area as ideas for what is needed. Mike and his staff are very grateful for our willingness to help.

Before our "snowstorm" on Sunday, there was another weather incident last Thursday. If you didn't notice, it was really windy with sustained

winds of between 25 and 30 miles per hour for almost 2 days. (Gusts even higher.)

On that day, I decided to put away our patio furniture, and organize the garage for the upcoming winter season. As I worked, I was amazed at the wind and its effect on the plants, ornamental grasses, and trees in our back yard. In fact, I think every leaf in a 5 mile radius tried to fly into our garage. At times, the tall grasses were bent over almost to the ground and the branches of the trees were being whipped violently and uncontrollably in every direction. In fact, I half expected to see a tree uprooted in the unrelenting wind. However, the trunks of the trees were unmoved; they were deeply rooted in a firm foundation.

As I watched nature in action, I was reminded of a few verses I had read recently. They were from Paul's letter to the new believers in Ephesus. He wrote that he longed to see them "deeply rooted and established in Christ's love," (Ephesians 3:17) and to no longer "be blown here and there by every wind of teaching." (Ephesians 4:14)

When the storms of life blow, it is easy to be caught up and tossed around, and pulled in every direction. Very much like the branches I observed in our trees last Thursday. Paul is reminding us that we need to be, not unlike the trunks of our trees, firmly grounded in Christ Jesus. If we are, then we will be safe and secure, regardless of how strong the winds blow.

Be sure you are not living on your own; in the branches where you will feel insecure, fragile, and blown around by the winds of life. Instead, be sure that your roots are deep, firm, and held strong by the power and beauty of Christ.
