But Sarah Hale wrote to Lincoln many times expressing the need for a National day of Thanksgiving. together. I highly recommend you look up these proclamations and discover the heart and brilliance of Lincoln, a true man of God.

Pastor Chuck summarized Lincoln's words in such a wonderful way that I thought they would give us all comfort, hope, and strength. Especially since conflict and war again rages in our nation and around the world.

Chuck begins by saying, "Look up. We thank You, our Father, for Your controls over our lives...for Your Son who saved us...for Your Word that lights our paths... for Your love that holds us close."

He continues, "Look around. We thank You, our Father, for our nation that is so blessed, beautiful, and bountiful...for family that is so valuable...for responsibilities that are so meaningful...for the comforts of home...for the encouragement of friends...for the enrichment of worship."

And he ends by saying, "Look within. We thank You our Farther, for the gift of life...for hands to work and play with...for legs to walk and run with...for a sense of humor, a tender spirit, and a positive attitude... for victories that uplift us, and heartaches that humble us... and for the warmth from those who help us, should our faculties fail us."

I hope you can take these words to heart. Maybe use them before you begin your bountiful feast this Thursday. But whatever you do, don't forget the one who gives life, in abundance! Have a wonderful and heartfelt Thanksgiving! In His Peace,
