A few years ago I saw a video that I would like to tell you about. It had everything to do with being grateful and thankful. Considering that it is a couple of days before Thanksgiving, I think it will be appropriate.

A blind man sat on the sidewalk of a major city with an upside down hat at his feet. He held a sign that said, "I am blind, please help." The hat contained only a few coins; spare change dropped in by folks as they rushed past.

A passerby slowly walked up to the blind man. He stopped, pulled out all his change and placed it into the hat. He then took the blind man's sign, turned it over, and wrote something on the back and returned it. He then made sure the new words could be read by everyone who passed by.

Soon, the hat began to fill. Many more people were stopping, exchanging pleasantries, and filling the hat with coins and dollars. A few hours later, the blind man recognized the footsteps of the person earlier that morning. "You were the person who changed my sign," he said. "What did you write?" The person said, "I didn't really change much. I just wrote what you said, but in a little different way." He wrote, "Today is a beautiful day, but I cannot see it."

Both signs spoke the truth. One said the man was blind, but the other reminded those walking by, how grateful they are to be able to see!

When your life seems full of troubles, it is hard to keep an attitude of gratefulness. We only see our problems swirling like a storm passing through our lives. Conversely, when things are going too smoothly, we have a tendency to take these moments for granted. When we do, we often forget to be thankful.

We need to be grateful, joyful, and thankful, as Paul wrote, "In all circumstances." (1 Thessalonians 5: 16-17) If we do, we will find that our lives become more at peace. And we will begin attracting even more things in our lives to be thankful for.
