In 1973, I began my career in fabrics that lasted over 35 years. It all started in a furniture store in Lancaster, Ohio. I quickly realized that selling wasn't enough. I needed to know about the different types of upholstery fabrics. Things like, what were the yarns made from, how they would wear, and even how they were dyed. And then custom draperies were added which began my lifelong love of fabrics.

Upholstery fabrics were ok. But their main function was to look good and be able to withstand the daily wear and tear of a family. But drapery fabrics are something entirely different. First, they come in a variety of widths; 36", 45", 48", 54", 60", and even 118". Then there are

different yarns like cotton, nylon, polyester, rayon, wool, and silk. There are different ways for dying. Yarn dyed, beam dying, as well as print dying. And then there is screen printing. Most prints have an average of 5 to 10 separate colors added. However, a 16 screen print is one of the most beautiful and skillful prints available. Then there are treatments like polished cottons, chintz cottons, and even waxed cottons. And lest we forget, how are the different yarns made as well as their properties? Which accept dyes, what is its thickness, how many twists per inch and so on. Then, how will the fabric react when sewn into different treatments. Will they hang or flair? Will they stretch or shrink? Will they drape smoothly when cut on a bias or break? And you thought they were just curtains!

So, why am I giving you a lesson in custom draperies? It is so you may understand the most important step that I am about to share. All fabrics must be woven together. They all start out with a warp yarn. That is the vertical yarn that is pulled tight on the loom. Then the weft, the horizontal yarn called the fill, is woven into the warp yarn. Depending on the placement, the weave, and the type of yarn used, it will produce a look, a feel, or a distinct pattern that is desired. It's an amazing thing to see. However, there is one more thing to consider; without the strength of the warp, the weft will fail. But without the weft and its intricate support, the warp is worthless.

Hmmm! One gives strength, one gives support. Gee, that sounds a lot like our lives doesn't it? There are times when we are the warp, the strong foundation to someone in need. But then there are times when we are the weft, and in need of a little support from someone else.

But it goes even deeper than that. To me, some of the most beautiful fabrics are Brocades, Jacquards, and Tapestries. They are the ones that have the most intricate weavings; one yarn supporting another, each strengthening the other, each a different color and texture, each with a specific placement. Does that not sound like our lives?

We are all made in God's image. We are all fearfully and wonderfully made. But if we were all a blue yarn, that would be a rather boring piece of fabric. Our God has woven each of us, the whole world together, to form a magnificent tapestry of life. If we would all just take a step back and look at the pattern, I think we would see how our lives are connected and interwoven, especially when we love and support each other. And we would then see how our lives together, become the perfect picture of Heaven on earth.
