We've all heard the phrase "If the shoe fits, wear it!" It's a not so subtle way of saying; you made this mess of your life, live with it. However, I would like to look at it in a little more positive light.

A number of years ago, a friend of mine, who helped people in depressed regions of eastern Kentucky, called me with a simple request. A man he knew there had secured a job interview. One thing needed was a pair of black dress shoes. They were needed not only for the interview, but for the job itself, if hired. Being from coal country, dress shoes are quite scarce.

At that time, I was working with men's shelters and thrift stores around the state and could secure most any item needed, especially a pair of used dress shoes. However, the request was for a pair of black lace up shoes, (so far so good) in size 15. Size 12 and even 13's are fairly common, but 15's are next to impossible to find. After checking with our resources, I called my friend and said it would be easier if we just ordered a brand new pair and shared the cost.

Two weeks earlier, I had made an appointment with a men's shelter in Youngstown for the following day. As I was talking with the administrator, their manager stopped by to say hello. I asked her if she had a pair of men's black shoes in size 15. Her eyes opened wide and said with a laugh, "are you serious?" then walked on down the hall. Ten

minutes later she was back with a look of amazement on her face. She then handed me a pair of size 15, men's black lace up dress shoes. Her comment to me was, "these just came in 5 minutes ago."

1 Timothy 6: 17-18 says to "not put your hope in wealth, but to put your hope in God, who provides us with everything for our enjoyment." And we are "commanded to do good, be rich in good deeds, and to be generous and willing to share." We are to provide for another's physical needs through the love of Christ. Someone had shoes that were not needed any longer. Someone else, 350 miles away needed a pair of shoes. God, in His perfect plan provided for that man's physical needs through the generosity of others.

In this same vein, how about another story of generosity. We just received a thank you note from The Head Start Program about our willingness to help with their Thanksgiving meals. They received so much "extra" food they were able to have a mini food pantry for the families in greatest need. But the best part of her letter was about the turkeys we donated with the extra money you, the church contributed. She was afraid to ask anyone to supply turkeys, and was having sleepless nights worrying because they only had enough money to supply a few. Then along comes FCC with the exact amount to supply enough turkeys for the remaining families. In her words, she wrote, "I feel God used you (FCC) to teach me what charitable giving truly is. Through your generous congregation, I am able to see how good our God is. Abundantly, lavishly, wonderful! - Doing more that I imagined. It was a faith strengthening moment working with you!"

Don't you just love being used by God! To be part of His grand plan and touch others in ways we can sometimes only imagine. This season of

Advent is the perfect time to look around and see who needs help, and then with God's direction, to act. Oh, and by the way. The man had his interview, secured the job and was able again, to provide for his family. The last words I heard from him were, "the shoes fit perfectly; they felt as if I broke them in myself, that they were a part of me." When the shoe fits, well, you know the rest!
