We live in the era of the 24-hour news cycle. News, sports, and weather are blasted at us round the clock from televisions, radios, Facebook, email, texts, and tweets, to mention just a few.

I think many of us can remember when television signed off around midnight, and the radio station's signal became distorted after 6pm, making it really hard to listen. So, what did we do? Turned them off and waited for the newspaper the next day. The problem here is obvious. If an emergency, such as a fire, tornado, or other disaster was occurring, you wouldn't know about it until it was too late to act. Oh, there were emergency broadcast radio messages, but the radio needed to be turned on to receive it. Many signals went unheard because many weren't listening.

This reminds me of an incident in 1 Samuel. The priests were corrupt and lost their spiritual bearings allowing the nation to drift from God. In 1 Samuel 3:1 it says, "The word of the Lord was rare; there were not many visions." Yet God persisted. He began to speak to a young boy named Samuel who was being raised in a priest's home.

Earlier, the boy's mother prayed to God for a son. Her prayer was answered, so she named him Samuel, which means "the Lord hears." God's part of the answered prayer was that the child would be raised into the priesthood.

One night Samuel couldn't sleep and kept hearing a voice calling him. Three times he went to Eli the priest asking what he wanted. Finally, Eli realized that it must be God speaking, and instructed Samuel to listen, and the next time he hears the voice to say, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

Notice that it is the servant who hears the voice. We, like Samuel need to listen and obey what God has revealed to us in His scriptures. We also need to submit and commit our lives as humble servants to Him. But the only way we can do this, is to keep our Bibles open, and to be sure our "radios" are kept on, and tuned to God's clear station that never fades or distorts. And when you hear His voice, say "speak, for your servant is listening."
