Last Sunday's message made me stop and think about Peter and what Mark records that Jesus said to him earlier in the evening. Jesus said, "Before the rooster crows twice, you will deny me 3 times." Peter, after denying he knew Jesus, ran from the courtyard of Caiaphas and wept bitterly. It appears that Peter missed his chance.

Let's face it. We live in a world that allows one chance, and one chance only. Game shows that give you one chance to answer. Get it wrong and you lose. Or, one chance to hit in the winning run in the bottom of the 9th, or one chance to make the winning basket before the buzzer goes off. Take a test and what you write will determine pass or fail. Besides a mulligan in golf (if the person you are playing with allows it), our world doesn't give many do-overs.

What came to me was this. What if God only gave us one chance in life to get it right? Think of Peter at that moment. I'm sure he thought he had committed an unpardonable sin. How often do we each think the same thing? Peter had a chance to "get it right," and failed. How often have each of us failed in the same way?

Seems to me I recall when Jesus was asked, how often should you forgive someone, up to 7 times? His answer was, "not 7, but 77 times." The devil wants us to believe there is a limit to God's forgiveness, but Jesus is saying God's grace is unlimited. When (note: I say when and not

if) we make a wrong choice, confess it to God and receive His forgiveness and restoration, (1 John 1:9) and know that there is no limit to our Loving God's grace.

But what about Peter and his dilemma? Well, I guess you will have to wait until after Easter to learn, "The Rest of The Story." (My apologies to Paul Harvey.)
