As I was making a deposit at our local bank, the teller yawned two or three times, almost losing track of where she was in the midst of the transaction. Of course, that reminded me of a story I read recently.

A German bank teller was in the middle of a money transfer when he accidently dozed off, while his finger was on the "2" key. The amount he was to transfer was 62.40 euros. However, his "power nap" transferred 222 million euros, almost 300 million dollars, into the customer's account. (Not a bad windfall.) This mistake cost the teller, and an employee who verified the transfer, their jobs. By being sleepy, not watchful, and not able to keep alert, their actions almost became a nightmare for the bank. (Yes, the transfer was corrected.)

Part of our message this Sunday will take place in a garden called Gethsemane. Jesus takes His disciples there for some quiet time and prayer. Jesus then instructed them to stay awake, to stay alert, and to "keep watch" with Him (Mark 14: 34). But they all fell asleep (vv.37, 40-41). Their failure to stay awake and pray left them defenseless. When Jesus needed them the most, their lack of vigilance left them weak and unable to come to His aid, and they all fled Him. (Mark 14:50.)

We all need to remain physically awake, as well as spiritually aware by spending more time in God's Word. All kinds of unwanted problems and temptations can be "deposited" in our lives if we don't keep watch, stay awake, be vigilant, and pray.
