Can you imagine the joy Pheidippides must have felt as he drew closer and closer to Athens? And then, imagine the great celebration that began when he delivered the good news to the people.

Sound a little familiar? Less than 2 weeks ago, we read about another marathon that was run to tell of another great victory and good news. Mary didn't run anywhere near 40 kilometers, but after an angel said to her that Jesus had "risen from the dead", she was to "go quickly and tell His disciples." Mary, "afraid yet filled with joy," ran to tell the disciples what was revealed to her. (Matthew 28: 7-8)

Marathon runners today run for pleasure and for personal achievements, and that is ok. But Pheidippides and Mary both ran with a purpose and a joy to bring good news of a great victory; one for a country, and one for all mankind.

My prayer is that each of us can have the same joy and expectation to run to our neighbor (yes, even the ones next door) as Mary did, to deliver the good news of Jesus' victory over death, so we all might live with Him forever.
