I remember we tried an experiment with our youth group years ago. We took pages from a magazine and ripped them up into small pieces. We then divided the group up into pairs, gave each a page and told them that the first to put the page together won a prize. No one finished! Then it occurred to us. The pages were printed on both sides and no one had any idea of what they were reassembling. No one had seen the

original picture. Oh, eventually a few did get them put back together, but what a "flop" this fun learning exercise became.

But isn't that what life seems to be? A puzzle? All our lives have many intricate pieces to it. Family, friends, jobs, health, successes, failures, even finances. Yes, I've only just scratched the surface as to how many pieces. Sometimes, I'm sure we all have been like those in our youth group when nothing in our lives seems clear, nothing makes sense, that nothing fits together. If that's the case, then there is only one thing missing. The one clear picture that is needed to help put the puzzle of life together.

The one verse in the Bible that I think explains it all is Colossians 1:6, "All things were created by Him and for Him." These are words that bring all the pieces of our lives together. The bottom line is, God created us to live for Him, yet we often try to live for us. Sin has separated us from God, and that is what makes it so difficult to bring the pieces of our lives together. Sin blocks us from seeing the finished picture.

Jesus then comes along and takes all our sins from us and nails them to His cross. This allows us to clearly see Jesus as the finished picture that allows us to put the pieces of our lives together, to have faith, and to live for Him. May God, through Jesus, our Savior, bless you All.
