Have you noticed the buds and blooms that are beginning to show on all the trees and bushes around town? Doesn't it seem that just yesterday we were amid the cold and dark of winter? Thinking that it would never end? But then, unexpectedly something happens. We see signs of renewal; signs that spring is truly on the way. is neatly folded on the shelf where His body had been laid. We ask ourselves what has happened?

Just as the sun breaks over the horizon, we see someone walking toward us; someone who looks familiar. Then, with a flash of recognition we see that it is our Lord! It's Jesus! In shock, astonishment, and rising joy in our hearts we fall to our knees and cry out, "Rabboni!" And then, with a peace that sweeps over us, we hear the sweetest word ever spoken! For in that moment, our Lord and Savior speaks just one word... one beautiful word... He calls us each by name!
