One of the side benefits of me traveling was being able to find wonderful bakeries and unusual places to eat. Trust me when I say, "Tim Horton's" and "McDonald's" can't hold a candle to some of the great "off the wall" eateries I have had the pleasure to experience.

One that comes to mind is a place called "Pete's Famous Hot Dogs." While visiting Betsy and André a number of years ago, we were introduced to this long established Birmingham tradition.

In 1939, Pete purchased a little hotdog business that was established before the start of World War I. "Little" being the operative word. In fact, it wasn't as much "off the wall," as it was in the wall. The stand is nestled between two buildings and the entire business space is 7ft wide by 20ft deep. Try to picture the counter, grills, inventory, and people all in a space smaller than most living rooms. But with their special sauce and Pete's son Gus fixing each dog, and a line of people around the block waiting to be served; it wasn't lunch, it was an event! Sadly Gus, who took over in 1948 passed away in 2011, and the business closed its door forever. To this day, many still long for the taste of Pete's famous hotdogs and secret sauce.

People waiting to get in, a narrow door, the owner closes the door. Hmmm...This reminds me of Luke 13: 22-25. Jesus was asked if it was true that "only a few will be saved." (vrs.23) His response is quite telling. You see, many people felt that they only had to be of the linage of Abraham to be saved. Jesus tells us something different. He says, "Make every effort to enter the narrow door, because many will try and not be able. Once the owner gets up and closes the door, you will stand

outside knocking, but won't get in." (vrs.24-25) Jesus was saying, the path to the Kingdom is not the wide and easy path of the world, but the path of suffering, self-denial, and child-like attitudes. And once the door is closed, only those who entered will enjoy the feast. Those left outside will be told, "I don't know you."

We live in a world of wide-open temptations, enticing us at every turn. We need to follow Jesus, and respond to His word. We are to look for the narrow door, because through it is something good, something unique, and indeed, something worth standing in line for. The door may be narrow, but like the little shop in downtown Birmingham, the narrow door is wide open to all who will place their trust in Jesus. But be sure you aren't distracted, because The Owner (our Father) may close the door when you least expect it, and you will miss out on the greatest feast of all.
