We need to be attached to someone who will protect us from running out of control and crashing. Paul wrote in Colossians 1:16, "We were created by Him and for Him." Of course, Paul is referring to Jesus. So, maybe we should let Him run the life that He gave us so we can "live for Him." In other words, Jesus is the track of life we should be attached to.

Too many people try to live their lives by themselves. But, without a track to guide them, their lives will ultimately spiral out of control. So, what is the answer? I think the writer of Hebrews says it perfectly when he writes, that with Jesus, "you have an anchor for the soul, firm and secure." Hebrews 6:19. (That sounds like a track we can count on.)
